The CLA Board held a retreat at the home of Karen Freeman on January 20. Seven board members were in attendance.


Discussion centered around our Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats.

CLA Trip to Crystal Bridges Museum









... I began my artistic journey just a few short years ago. But, I have always been creative. I was raised in a home with lots of creativity. My father was in the military and was a musician so I began to sing when I was a young teenager. Music was the biggest part of my life growing up and still is. I was born in England and lived there until I was two years old. I spent a lot of my growing up years in Mississippi but our family roots were in Arkansas and I have been here for the past 35 years.

In 2012 I was blessed to have published my first book and though I love writing, like so much of the arts, it was a difficult place for me once I was not traveling and speaking. I have books that I have written that will likely never be published. This did not stop me from finding other ways to be creative. About seven years ago I traveled to Germany with my church and there I was involved with a ministry that fights human trafficking and I was moved by those beautiful ladies and their stories. When I returned I decided to begin another journey of taking my passion for this fight and combining that with my artistic side. I began to make jewelry, selling it and taking the proceeds and giving back to this fight. That wasn't the thing that would ignite a lot of joy so after a few years I gave that up. I was still writing, mainly children's stories, and needed an illustrator and my husband suggested that I do it myself. I didn't draw! But I found an online course and to this day will forever be grateful to my, now friend, Cindy Wider from Australia for setting me on that path. I don't illustrate, that was not me! But I began to love to draw and paint and the rest, as they say, is history.

I have studied with numerous teachers for the past 5 years and continue to do so. I am a perpetual learner and love to try new ways of creating art. I paint primarily with watercolor and acrylic but I am doing some experimenting with mixed media for the purpose of doing workshops with the women at the Harbor Home. This goes along with my passion for seeing women set free from a life of prostitution and addiction. I am also working as a surface pattern designer and have a shop on Spoonflower, a print on demand site and have just recently added over 40+ patterns to that site. So, I just keep moving forward filling my days with art of some kind!! I am learning the art of hand-lettering at the moment! LOL! For me it is a labor of love and a way for me to help fight human trafficking, the reason I work to sell my art!





The workshop on painting with a pallet knife was a huge success. Ten participants spent the day November 19 with Eva Haley, who provided them with examples and "how to's" to excel using only a pallet knife.





Eva demonstrated her technique for underpainting and then layered detail onto the canvas with the pallet knife.

<u>Be sure your entry forms are complete</u>, your membership is current, and wire hangers are properly installed on 2-D work. Pieces that do not conform to the guidelines will be rejected.

Entry Fee: \$20 for 1 / \$25 for 2 / \$30 for 3.





Narrative and Composition in Visual Art" on March 12th. During his presentation, he shared what makes a compelling composition and how he uses the design principles to tell a story within his artwork. See his handouts below.

Aspects of Composition

What is composition?

At its core, composition is the arrangement of component parts of an image in a piece of artwork, done in an effort to create an engaging and interesting visual to look at. Successful compositions will manipulate the viewer's eye in such a way that it wanders across the image surface in the way the artist intended.

Aspects of Composition

- Balance: the perceived distribution of visual weights in a composition that seeks to create a sense of equillibruim for the viewer. There are four kinds of balance:
 - 1. Symmetrical
 - 2. Asymmetrical
 - 3. Radial
 - 4. Crystallographic (all over pattern)
- Contrast: Contrast is also a term used in the Principles of Design, but when talked about in
 terms of composition, it can be more than just the use of dark and light. It might also refer to
 the contrast between subjects or shapes as well. It is often used to amplify other aspects of
 composition.
- Emphasis or Focal Point: The focal point is an area of high emphasis in the composition,
 often drawing the viewer's eye to that spot and is often used by the artist to help guide the viewer
 in a particular way.
 - 1. often referred to as the most important aspect or component of an artwork
 - 2. often where the viewer's eye keeps coming back to rest
 - it can be achieved many ways, including but not limited to the use of color, contrast, isolation placement, degree of emphasis, absence, and perspective
 - 4. you can have more than one point of emphasis as long as they don't compete






